



# But Youth Are Disconnected

Eastern Kentucky leads the state for the highest rate of disconnected youth with 22% of youth ages 16-24 not enrolled in school or working, even part-time jobs (Kentucky Youth Advocates, 2015).

SOAR's Blueprint for the Future of Appalachia is a plan that outlines seven goals that will drive the transformation of Appalachia Kentucky. The Blueprint was created through the input of thousands of people from diverse communities across the region.

### SOAR's 7 Pillars

The first goal is broadband connectivity, and the other six goals are what we plan to do with it to transform the region.



Increase the availability of affordable high-speed broadband, through fiber, to businesses and residents; and increase adoption rates throughout the SOAR region



### 21ST CENTURY WORKFORCE

Develop our regional workforce to be competitive in the digital economy and other emerging industries



#### **SMALL BUSINESS**

To create more and expand existing small businesses within the region by taking full advantage of the digital economy



#### HEALTHY COMMUNITIES

To reduce the physical and economic impact of obesity, diabetes, and substance use disorder



### INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT

Increase the amount of industrial employment which includes manufacturing, natural resources, processing, and distribution by expanding existing companies and attracting new ones



Create a local foods movement by connecting local producers to markets for their products both within and outside the region



REGIONAL TOURISM DEVELOPMENT

Establish Kentucky's Appalachian region as a tourism destination

### PHS teacher named Teacher of the Year by CEDAR

Wendy Poe, in her first year as a teacher at Paintsville High School, and for the second year in a row, has been named CEDAR, Inc.'s Teacher of the Year for her Future of Work Study Unit.

"I was really quite surprised because changing from elementary school to high school kids was a big change for me," Poe said. "I've worked with high school kids before, but they are different than elementary school kids, in a good way, but, you're talking to young adults and they're so much more developed and they can think outside the box a lot more and they were so receptive to me for coming into their school

ways, even when we were in coal for 27 years, we've always encouraged teachers to get their students outside of the classroom. It's more fun and when they have fun. they retain what they've learned," Justice said. "We made a pivot at the beginning of last school year and we're now the CEDAR Future of Working Appalachia Education Initiative ... now. rather than the focus being coal, it's the seven pillars of the SOAR blueprint and we're getting that into the schools, K-12, to where students will have the opportunity to become involved in

"We feel that the best way to do that is through entrepreneurship innovation until we have a culture here of small- to medium-sized enterprises, rather than depending on large industry like coal," Justice continued. "Rather than putting eggs in big baskets, we need ours students to learn the importance of entrepreneurship and how they can be part of this movement through innovation and entrepreneurship."

Both Justice and Poe said tapping those young minds and their imagination and potential was a key aspect of finding success in this arena.

"They might come up

with some ideas that would be applicable to what SOAR is doing, so, we're really excited about it," Justice said. "Their minds are uninhibited and unrestricted and we encourage them to think outside of the box, because us old people are set in our wavs.'

"It's the young minds that are going to take us off," Poe said.



## Entrepreneurial Coal Lands Redevelopment Program (9th-12th)









High school teams identify and select a previously mined site or coal camp community. Then through investigation and research, propose a new use and business model that involves one or more of the seven SOAR pillars to repurpose/revitalize the site in a way that will provide jobs and a better quality of life for people in the community. Each team produces a:

- -Site Profile Report
- -Business Plan
- -Elevator Pitch
- -Physical or Virtual Model



### Entrepreneurial Coal Lands Redevelopment Program Cash Awards

#### Students

- 1st Place-\$1,000 per team member, up to five
- 2<sup>nd</sup> Place- \$750 per team member, up to five
- 3<sup>rd</sup> Place- \$500 per team member, up to five

#### Coaches

- 1st Place- up to \$2,000 (\$20.00 per % points earned)
- 2<sup>nd</sup> Place- up to \$1,250 (\$12.50 per % points earned)
- 3<sup>rd</sup> Place- up to \$750 (\$7.50 per % points earned)





Originally formed to support coal education, CEDAR's award-winning design now meets the needs of today's students and educators by focusing on entrepreneurship and innovation.






